There was a bad harvest of apples in 1845 and many people were without food and in the next sixteen years half a million people died in Ireland. Many people decided to travel to Europe to escape the famine, usually travelling by train.

The man's name is Sean Reidy. He explains that the ship is a (1) of the original Dunbrody Famine ship. The original ship was built in (2), Canada in 1845 and was one of 12 to 15 ships owned by William Graves of New Ross.

When the ship came back to Ireland in (3), it was immediately used to take people to (4) to escape from the famine. There were (5) people on the ship travelling across the Atlantic, not knowing where they were going and the journey lasted six (6). The passengers had very basic (7) and their accommodation was below deck so the passengers were without (8) or natural lighting except for half an hour a day when they were allowed on deck.
